Byron Petty's CD, **Traveler's Tales**, was released in January, 2007 on the Capstone Record label. It contains recent chamber compositions from 2003-2006 performed by members of the ARDO CONSORT and is available through the website www.capstonerecords.org (CPS-8776) or through Albany Records.

In February of 2007, Mysteries of the Orchard for mixed ensemble and prepared CD was performed at two concerts (Washington & Lee University, VA / Radford University, VA) by Alum celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Peabody Conservatory of Music, and in April, the Elon University Orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Thomas Erdmann, premiered Moon-Shadows for small orchestra. The University of Missouri Brass Quintet premiered Kenyon Wilson's Trifecta on November 6, 2007. Trifecta is scored for solo trombone with brass quartet accompaniment. William Mann, Assistant Professor of Trombone at the University of Missouri, was the soloist.

Terry Vosbein's newest composition *The Peregrination Suite*, a commission by pianist Alexandre Dossin, will be premiered in Lexington, Virginia in March followed by a performance in Eugene, Oregon in April. Also on the Eugene program will be his *Village Scenes* for alto sax and piano, performed by Idit Shner and David Riley.

Vosbein has been awarded a residency at the Cite Internationale des Arts in Paris to compose a concert of largeensemble jazz works. He will spend the first four months of 2008 composing music inspired by his recent research in the Stan Kenton archives at the University of North Texas.

This mammoth Kenton research project, sponsored by the Hewlett-Mellon foundation, has recently been published online at www.macusa.com/kenton and Vosbein will be giving a presentation of his results in February at the Lionel Hampton Jazz History and Culture Conference in Moscow, Idaho.
